Outdoor Classroom

An outdoor classroom for our students has been the vision of principal Susan Higley for years. Research shows that outdoor classrooms improve student achievement, mental, social, and emotional well-being, as well as behavioral and intellectual development. With the onset of the pandemic and encouragement of social distancing, outdoor classrooms can also provide alternative locations for learning to occur and classes to still function successfully. The Towanda Education Foundation was happy to contribute toward making this vision a reality by granting funds through the Teacher Venture Grant Program.



School Store for Positive Behavior

The School Store for Positive Behavior Grant, awarded through the Towanda Education Foundation's Teacher Venture Grant Program, was used to purchase items for two carts that were utilized at the end of each school week by every classroom in J Andrew Morrow. Students cash in their DOJO points for tangible prizes and other rewards. Students strive every day to follow the 3 Rs by showing Respect to Themselves, Respect to Others, and Respect to Property, and in turn earn DOJO points from faculty and staff. With the addition of the school store cart, an increase in student engagement in making positive behavior choices has been seen in and out of school.

Knightly News Filming Set

The Knightly News Crew has slowly grown from only 7-8 students in 2016 to a bulging classroom of students in 2021! The size of this class is increasing year to year due to the popularity of wanting to be involved with the Knightly News. This year, after receiving the venture grant, we purchased more equipment that would continue to improve the quality of our news broadcast program.

With the money from this year's grant, we purchased a ring light, camera video cage film movie-making kit, blackout curtains, Knightly News Crew/ Stream Team Crew t-shirts, tripods, set furniture, and an interview table. All of these items greatly enhance the experience for the students and gives the feel of a true news filming set.

Knightly News is continuing to grow due to the financial help from the Education Foundation Venture Grant program. Without this help, we would not be able to keep improving the quality of our work. The Knightly News Crew would like to thank you all for supporting us!

Civil War Closet

The Towanda Education Foundation recently awarded the Teacher Venture Grant, Civil War Closet, submitted by 5th Grade Teacher Mr. Greg Hughey. The grant was used to purchase Civil War gear that are replicas of what was used in the Civil War. Mr. Hughey worked with the Regimental Quartermaster in Gettysburg, PA, to help assemble the closet. He has purchased a Union and a Confederate soldier's uniform along with a variety of pouches the soldiers had to carry during the war to hold their rations, ammunition, and gear. Mr. Hughey's goal was to bring the Civil War to life for the kids and to give them a better feel for what a soldier had to endure each day.

Mindfulness Garden

The Mindfulness Garden has been funded by the Towanda Education Foundation through the Teacher Venture Grant Program. The grant has been used to purchase materials for a horseshoe bench that fits 30-35 students, a single bench, rose bushes, flowers, a bronze plaque, as well as miscellaneous garden supplies. This mindfulness garden will be used by classrooms at J. Andrew Morrow and will be honoring Mrs. Karen Beirne-Getz.

Mrs. Karen Beirne-Getz truly believed in the positive impacts of mindfulness and being in nature. One thing she wanted to see happen was the implementation of a mindfulness room within the building. That was able to happen! Another idea she always talked about was having an outdoor space where students and teachers can learn while benefitting from the effects of an open-air setting. The generosity of this grant will help provide just that!

The mindfulness garden will be a shared responsibility between the students at J. Andrew Morrow. Teachers and students can utilize the garden area and/or calm the mind. Also, the students can use this space to learn about gardening and the process of taking care of a variety of flowers and rose bushes.



Hygiene Station Project

Many students at J Andrew Morrow come to school with little knowledge of basic hygiene practices due to a lack of guidance and practice of proper hygiene within their homes. These students also lack access to a daily shower/bath, hygiene essentials like shampoo and soap or clean clothing. This often leads to students coming to school feeling uncomfortable around their peers, which can cause low self-esteem and low self-confidence. Moreover, personal hygiene is more important than ever in current times as we move through the COVID pandemic as practicing basic hygiene habits are crucial in preventing the spread of infectious disease. The Hygiene Station would be a safe place in the



school for students to get cleaned up, learn appropriate hygiene habits, and feel confident in themselves. The earlier we can instill good hygiene habits in students the more confident they will be in themselves as they move through their school years and into puberty.

The Hygiene Station Project will bring a space to J Andrew Morrow for students to learn and maintain basic hygiene habits. This space would include a shower, towels, shampoo, conditioner, soap, and washcloths that would allow students to be able to learn to clean themselves properly. Additionally, students would receive instruction on how to brush their teeth along with being provided a toothbrush and toothpaste. The Hygiene Station would also include instructions and guidance for students on how to use the Hygiene Station provided by their School Guidance Counselor or School Social Worker.

This project is being partially funded by the Towanda Education Foundation through the Teacher Venture Grant Program.

Instruments for the Economically Disadvantaged

A big thank you from the elementary band program to the Towanda Education Foundation Venture Grant Program! Each year the elementary music department has been the recipient of a perpetual grant that provides musical instruments to the band's equipment inventory. This inventory has been necessary in that it offers students who are economically challenged the opportunity to participate in the instrumental music program. The cost of acquiring a quality functioning instrument can be astronomical and has been an obstacle for those students who do not have the resources to make such a purchase. This year, the grant secured the purchase of two clarinets and one flute, which will help sustain our inventory for both current and future use.



Educational Improvement Tax Credit (EITC)



Thank you C&N Bank for your continued support to the Towanda Education Foundation through the EITC (Educational Improvement Tax Credit) program!

Four projects will receive funding this year thanks to the generous donation from Citizens and Northern Bank (C&N), First Citizens Community Bank and UPMC. C&N donated \$18,000, First Citizens Community Bank donated \$11,000 and UPMC donated \$1,000 to the Foundation through a state program called the Educational Improvement Tax Credit (EITC). EITC provides eligible Pennsylvania businesses with the opportunity to receive a tax credit on certain PA taxes by donating to Educational Improvement Organizations, such as the Towanda Education Foundation for approved educational programs. Currently, four projects have been approved through the Foundation by the state; Science & Technology with Radio Controlled Cars, Life

Science in Motion: Radio Controlled Learning



Thanks to the support from the Foundation and other local businesses, Science in Motion, Radio Controlled Learning has been an ongoing part of Science, Technology, and Society class (AKA: Automotive Technology) for the past several years. In this class the students use battery powered radio-controlled cars to learn about automotive-related technology, and the automobile in general. The overall goal is to provide students with a better understanding of how an automobile works by using the much smaller 1/10th scale radio-controlled cars and trucks as we do not have the facilities for full-sized vehicles.

Unfortunately, even though the vehicles themselves are 1/10th scale, many of the parts do not cost 1/10th of the price. Therefore, much of the grant funds provided each year are used for repair and maintenance on the 16 radio-controlled vehicles we use and maintain. Much like a normal automobile, radio-controlled vehicles need things like tires, batteries, motors, computers, and various suspension and steering parts to function. Also, like normal automobiles, typically these parts do not last forever, and they can break/fail at any time. It is because of the Education Foundation that we have been able to provide this unique learning experience to our students.
