7th Annual Black Knight Bash Virtual Online Auction was a HUGE Success!



The 2022 Black Knight Bash was held virtually this year and was a success. Participants were able to register online and place bids on live auction items. The generosity of the community resulted in over 200 auction items up for bid, raising over \$15,000.

Proceeds from the Bash help fund the Foundation's Venture Grant Program, which is designed to provide teachers with the means to implement their "dream activities" in their classrooms. The grants are


The Little Closet is one of many projects funded through the Towanda Education Foundation Venture Grant Program and benefits the students of Towanda Area School District.

The Little Closet

Last year we received a venture grant and a generous donation from a local business to install a shower and provide basic hygiene items for students at J Andrew Morrow. This year a venture grant was used to replenish the supplies of the hygiene station and provide additional items for students, particularly clothing, at The Little Closet. The Hygiene Station project brings space to J Andrew Morrow for students to learn and maintain basic hygiene habits. Now that we are able to provide students with a place to practice good hygiene habits, we used this venture grant to stock a closet with coats, long sleeved shirts, short sleeved shirts, pants, shorts, undergarments, socks, winter hats, and winter gloves. The hygiene station is stocked with shampoo/conditioner, toothbrushes, toothpaste, hair detangler, combs, brushes, towels, laundry detergent, wipes, and other hygiene essentials. We named this space The Little Closet and it's similar to Rachel's Closet at the high school. Students and their families can visit the closet and hygiene station after experiencing a house fire, homelessness, foster care removal, or whenever they have a need for fresh clothes or hygiene products at school or home. The Hygiene Station and Little Closet are a safe place in the school for students to go to get cleaned up, learn appropriate hygiene habits, and feel confident in themselves and their appearance. The earlier we can instill good hygiene habits in students the more confident they will be in themselves and their ability to properly take care of their personal hygiene as they move through their school years.

Holocaust Literature Beyond the Classroom Grant

The Holocaust Literature Beyond the Classroom Grant is fundamental in providing opportunities for students to expand perspectives on the Holocaust through personal testimony. These experiences encourage students to make connections regarding social justice issues from the past and make applications in the present. The class participated in a gathering of Holocaust Survivors, an American liberator, and students from thirty-three school districts, thanks to the Towanda Area School District Education Foundation.

Students attended the 34th Annual Teen Symposium on the Holocaust in Scranton on May 11, 2022. This program began with the film Children Remember the Holocaust and provided a forum for participants to encounter survivors of the Holocaust. Discussions with these wit-

nesses, sharing their first-hand testimony, produced insights unique to "living history." The afternoon session featured the testimony of Mark Schonwetter, who survived the Holocaust as a young boy along with his mother and sister, hiding in forests and in homes of Polish families.

Furthermore, students learned about the liberation of the Gunskirchen concentration camp, a subcamp of Mauthausen, from Alan Moskin, a former Staff Sergeant in the 66th Infantry in General George

Patton's 3rd Army, who after attending the Nuremburg Trials, made law his profession.

The Holocaust Literature classes are grateful for the funding which made it possible to increase the depth of the curriculum beyond the classroom lessons.

Mindfulness Room Sensory Items Venture Grant

Many students at grade k-2, have effectively utilized these items in their classrooms and the mindfulness room to help them be more successful during the school day. A Taste of Indian Culture Grant

What does garam masala taste like? What is cumin? Does turmeric go on rice? The vision for the "A Taste of Indian Culture" grant was inspired by questions asked by students while reading works in the Asian Unit of World Literature. Despite our internet research of Indian spices, student curiosity and hunger remained about the taste of Indian cuisine.

Thankfully, after a two-year hiatus since 2019, English II students enjoyed the Indian Food Social once again in the Towanda Area Junior Senior High School cafeteria. The event provided the opportunity to taste authentic Indian dishes catered by New Delhi Diamonds of Ithaca, New York and celebrated the efforts of students in their preparation for the Literature Keystone Exam.

Hues of teal, pink, and gold transformed the cafeteria into a lovely setting. A canopy draped in vibrant-colored tulle covered a table offering peacock-themed cupcakes. Students gathered around tables each labeled with an Indian spice and ornamented with tissue paper, paper flowers, and hand-painted vases. Amid Indian music, the educational experience included an etiquette guide as the students dined on matar paneer, channa masala, basmati rice, nan, and gulab jamun.

Altogether the sights, sounds, smells, and tastes of the Indian Food Social fortified the connection of culture beyond the pages of World Literature. Upperclassmen served the current class.

The Little Knight Café Venture Grant

In December of this year the Life Skills classroom received a grant to start our coffee cart (Little Knights Cafe). The students really liked the experience. The cart gave them a feel for what a real job requires and skills needed with a real life setting. The skills these kids obtained throughout the year were eye contact, speaking skills, math skills, following directions, social skills, and independence. We were very blessed to get the grant to have this opportunity.

Motion Dynamics Venture Grant

The Go Direct Cart system has worked wonderfully for physics this year. We were able to test many different hypotheses concerning momentum and changes in inertia. During these tests students were able to collect real world data and confirm or reject true hypotheses.

The questions students wanted to answer are as follows:


- Is it worse to hit a brick wall or hit a car of equal mass and speed head on?
 - o This question was inspired by a MythBusters episode
- Would making cars elastic be better or worse?
- Would having sticky cars be better or worse?

The above questions were then refined and reworded into these testable hypotheses:

A car will experience great deceleration in a head on collision with an equal mass car traveling at the same speed than hitting an immovable object at the same speed.

- o Turns out that these 2 scenarios are equivalent. Although having a head on collision with an identical car going an identical speed is very unlikely. The MythBusters also cam to the same conclusion.
- A car will experience greater deceleration if it has an elastic collision than an inelastic collision.
 - o Turns out that having bumper cars for motor vehicles is a very bad idea. Students found that collisions of elastic nature cause much large accelerations and would likely cause far worse injuries for drivers.

The students set up the cars and began collecting real data. They were able to collect position, velocity, and acceleration data in all three dimensions. They were able to graph this data efficiently and run multiple trials in a short period of time due to the conve-

nience that Go Direct carts provide.

As you can see above the Go Direct carts offer a large variety of testing equipment making testing varied and diverse hypothesis very easy and intuitive.

In the future many more projects, demonstrations, and labs will involve this equipment. I and my students have only scratched the surface of what this equipment can teach us and we all look forward to answering more student generated questions.
